RECORD OF HEARING ON MOTION FOR PRELIMINARY INJUNCTION:

All motions for admission of attorneys pro hac vice granted without payment of fees.

All motions for leave to file amicus briefs granted.

Defendants' motion to dismiss (# 34) denied at this juncture.

Individual intervenors' motion for class certification (# 41) is in abeyance pending resolution of the merits of motion for permanent injunction.

With respect to the motion for preliminary injunction, the court finds serious questions on the merits and that the balance of hardships tips sharply in favor of the plaintiffs. Accordingly, and pursuant to the stipulation of the parties waiving any statutory time restraints, the court hereby orders the following:

1. The temporary restraining order is continued pending final resolution on the merits.
2. The directive of Attorney General Ashcroft issued on or about November 6, 2001, shall be unenforceable and of no legal effect pending further order of this court. Physicians, pharmacists, and other health care providers in Oregon shall not be subject to criminal prosecution, professional disciplinary action or other administrative proceedings for any actions taken in compliance with the Oregon Death with Dignity Act while this temporary restraining order remains in effect.

Briefing on the merits will proceed on the following schedule:

Plaintiff and plaintiff-intervenors shall have 60 days in which to file motions for summary judgment. Defendants shall have an additional 30 days to file their response and cross-motion for summary judgment. Plaintiff and plaintiff-intervenors shall have an additional 14 days to file replies, if any. A hearing will be set, if practicable, within 7 days of completion of briefing, and findings and conclusions will be issued within 30 days of the hearing.

Dear Librarian:

The National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) and other Federal agencies have been publishing and distributing drug abuse research and prevention publications since the late 1960's. Despite great strides in drug abuse research and significant changes in drug abuse patterns, we have received reports that many outdated publications from the late 1960's and the early 1970's are still in circulation. These publications reflect preliminary marijuana and cocaine research findings that often found equivocal results. In addition, the research did not relate to the young populations that began to use illicit drugs in 1977 and later.

This Institute is very concerned because these outdated publications can be misleading. We now know much more about the serious effects of these drugs and how they interfere with health and well-being. We began to update and revise our own publications in 1978 and have revised and reprinted most of our general information and education materials. Our primary objective is to communicate the health and social consequences of illicit drug-taking as part of our overall drug abuse prevention efforts.

Attached is a list of the Institute's outdated publications that have been withdrawn from circulation. I strongly suggest that you purge your collection of these old materials. We will send you our "Announcements of New Publications" whenever new materials are available. Also enclosed is a current list of Institute publications available from the National Clearinghouse for Drug Abuse Information. Please let your community libraries know of our concern because community groups and individuals depend on their local libraries for reliable and up-to-date information on drug abuse.
